
Microsoft's history with Hackathons

- Satya Nadella, third Microsoft CEO ever, took over in 2014
 - · Wanted a creative, entrepreneurial mentality in company culture and to become "learn-it-alls."
- The Garage was created as Microsoft's official portal to hacking culture
 - Plans and runs the Microsoft Global Hackathon, advocates for collaboration and innovation

Some facts


- Typically runs over a week every year open to anyone
- In 2014 Hackathon was planned for some 1,500 to 2,000 participants, ended up with 11,000
- The 2020 Hackathon saw over 70,000 participants the largest private hackathon on the planet.
- Many customers now involved with Microsoft and customer employees co-hacking

Hackathon tips - behave like a startup




Both paths are correct - have a clear vision for the use of technology but most important is to start small and fast and iterate rapidly from there

Hackathon tips - advantages of starting small (prototyping) and iterating



Allows rapid reprioritization Reduces risk – avoids dead ends and big misses Much less coordination required

Important when prototyping – build complete versions – the MVP






Microsoft Power Platform



One <u>low-code/no-code</u> platform that spans M365, Dynamics 365, and standalone applications


